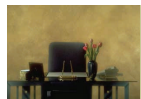

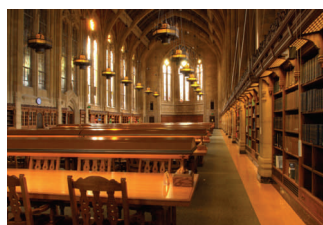
Library Partnerships

libraries' catalogs, and all of our databases can be accessed from home using your campus username and password. Remember to ask the library staff to add a barcode on the back of your ID so you will be able to borrow materials.

What I want to stress, though, is the partnership you can have with the library staff. They are a skilled and experienced group dedicated to your academic achievement as well as finding information for your leisure activities. You can call on them to make your time at Clinton Community College pleasurable and successful.

Fall Semester

The library has seen a flurry of activity with new and returning students this fall. Staff have added barcodes to new student, faculty, and staff college IDs to activate patron accounts. They are also busy providing assistance to patrons with computer logon and access questions.

New books have begun to arrive—browse the "New Books" cart located near the main circulation desk.

FAQS

? I want to print a PowerPoint presentation from my instructor's website so I can study the notes. When I print I get only one slide per page. How can I save paper and ink and print more slides on one page?

A. It's very easy to print six slides on a page. Just follow these steps:

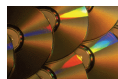
1. **Open the Microsoft PowerPoint file that you want to print.**
2. **In the upper left corner of the Standard toolbar, click "File", then "Print".**
3. **In the Print popup window look for the "Print what" box.**
4. **Click on the arrow to change "Slides" to "Handouts."**
5. **Click the [OK] button at the bottom of the window.**

If you want to see what your print-out will look like before you print, simply click the [Preview] button.



? Where can I make photocopies?

A. The library has two photocopiers, including a new one in the main reading room. Photocopies are \$0.10 per page, and the machine takes quarters, nickels, and dimes. Also, the library has a machine that will give you change for a dollar bill.

Nursing and Allied Health Databases

The library subscribes to several databases supporting our nursing and science programs. You can access these databases from the library homepage by clicking the [Online Periodicals](#) link.

*** CINAHL Plus with Full Text** - This database covers the

subjects of nursing and health, and includes over 560 journals in full text.

*** Health and Wellness Resource Center and Alternative Health Module** - This resource includes articles concerning alcoholism, complementary treatments, diseases, drug abuse, fitness, herbal remedies, medicine, nutrition, occupational health and safety, pregnancy, prescription drugs, public health,

and more.

*** Health Reference Center Academic** - This database covers health information from periodicals, books, & pamphlets. Most articles are available in full text.

*** Science Direct** - This resource features scholarly scientific journals, including nursing and health. Most articles are available in full text.

Ready for the Quad?

The 300th anniversary, or Tercentenary, of the voyage of Samuel de Champlain was celebrated in Plattsburgh on July 7, 1909. President William Howard Taft presided over the event and hosted a banquet of over 400 at the Hotel Champlain.

The 400th anniversary of the voyages of Champlain

and Henry Hudson and the 200th anniversary of Robert Fulton's steamboat voyage will be celebrated in 2009.

The Clinton Community College Quadricentennial Committee has begun planning a three-day event to take place on July 8, 9 and 10, 2009. Speakers, outdoor demonstrations, displays and entertainment will be part of the commemoration.

For those interested in reading about the 300th anniversary, our archives has copies of *The Champlain Tercentenary: Report of the New York Lake Champlain Tercentenary Commission* (1911). A brief version of the 1909 celebration is described in *Clinton County: A Pictorial History* (1988) located in the Adirondack collection.
